

The booth displayed some of the three-wheeled skates in the collection and educated visitors about the history of the roller skate. Many were dumbfounded to know that the first patented skate was indeed an in-line skate which is in the museum (check back page).

On to other news, I am glad to announce the museum will be cooperating with the San Francisco International Airport Museum for an exhibit in the summer of 1997. Our museum will be loaning over 75 objects to this museum for a three month exhibition. The S.F. museum will be sending a field team to visit our museum this fall to select the objects for next year.

The museum has continued to stay on the busy end with a redesigned exhibit — Roller Hockey. This topic has expanded to two cases displaying old photographs, drawings, and of course, skates. For the summer busy season, several other exhibit cases will be redesigned as well which include; Artistic Skating, The Evolution of the Wheel, Roller Hockey International League, and NIBBL (page 3).

The museum is always on the look out for roller skating memorabilia and has recently purchased a life size bronze statue of two girls with their roller skates entitled, "To the Skating Rink," by Prince Monyo Mihailescu-Nasturel. 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

ROLLER BASKETBALL



.....The New York Roller Club beat the Broadway Rink Five team three games to two in December, 1920 at the Broadway Roller Skating Rink in Brooklyn at Halsey & Broadway streets. These two teams have been playing basketball on roller skates and are pioneering this style. Large crowds have been witnessing this event and there seems to be a following starting. The final score of the tie-breaker game was N.Y. 28 Broadway 16. The stars of the game were Jack Lewis and Sam Heckler who were accountable for twenty of NY's total.....

Roller basketball has been around since the 1920's and a recent surge has been established. NIBBL, the National In-Line Basketball League was born in the fall of 1993 by former pro and collegiate basketball players who were also in-line skaters. This new league was founded by former NBA pro Tom LaGarde who has a passion for both sports.

Tom LaGarde formed this league out of frustration. After six years in the NBA with several knee surgeries, he took

up in-line skating to aid in his rehabilitation. He decided to mix the two which allowed him to play without much pain. Since starting the league, NIBBL has hosted its first World Championship, at Wollman Rink in New York City's Central Park, in May of 1994. Then in June, 1995, the second championship took place. A second world championship followed in June 1995. NIBBL toured the country with Team Gatorade at NBA Hoop-it-up tournaments. This year's championships will be held in New York in September.

NIBBL is a unique organization that bases their game on fast breaks and a few basic rules and regulations to follow. Each team consists of five players, four starters and a substitute. The court is played on the full 100 x 50 feet court. Basic skills such as starting, stopping, turning and going backwards are necessary to compete successfully. The ability to shoot, catch, and throw a basketball is also important, but not necessary to enjoy the game. All skaters are required to wear the universal 4-wheel in-line skates in sanctioned NIBBL competitions. No conventional or quad skates are permitted in NIBBL events.

NIBBL does operate in some similar ways to roller hockey, such as players must wear helmets in all competitions and is a non-contact sport. It is a sport of finesse, speed, endurance, ball handling skills, and of course skate skills.

The major rules of NIBBL are similar to those in college basketball. A field-goal is two points and a three point shot is from an arc of 21 feet. Fouls are called for holding, hacking, and tackling. Games are played in 40 minutes with two twenty-minute halves. Unlike basketball, substitutions can be made at any time during the game. The players involved in the change must tag each other for the substitute to enter the court. Another rule unlike the traditional no-skate game are free-throws. Free-throws are awarded only if the fouling team has eight or more fouls in a half which results in a penalty situation, or if a shooter is fouled in the last two minutes of the game.


