
Dear Members: The museum was bustling this summer with many visitors and I hope many of you were able to be among those visitors. Our summer visitors were able to enjoy two new exhibits, 50 Years of Skating Scouts, which explores Boy and Girl Scout roller skating badges, and Nebraska's Connection to Roller Skating, which explores past twenty years of the museum.

Fall has brought a higher level of behind the scenes activity in the museum. We have begun the large task of completing a shelf-by-shelf inventory of our entire collections. Jennifer Cook, Assistant Curator, has taken this project under her wing and will be assisted by graduate Museum Studies students from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln on November 3. The students, members of the Association of Museum Studies Students, volunteer one day each semester to assist a local museum complete or work on a project. We are looking forward to their assistance and hope to complete a large chunk of the inventory before January.

The museum's fiscal year came to end on August 30 along with our 20th anniversary year and the Money to Grow on Fund campaign. The museum received a total donation of \$915 from fifty donors from September 1, 2000 to September 30, 2001. Thank you to all of the donors for helping to make our campaign a success. In conjunction with the beginning of our new fiscal year, we are offering a new renewing membership benefit, a print of one of our paintings in the collection. The

A Profile in Skating Courage

The following article was reprinted from the November 1964 issue of **Skate** newspaper.

At the Yankee Stadium in New York there is a strange roar during the World Series days and it is a legend that it echoes from the days of Babe Ruth.

The roar rumbles in recollection of the Babe and his feats with his prodigious bat which transformed baseball in to the national pastime.

Six miles from the Yankee Stadium stands Madison Square Garden, often referred to as the mecca of sports. There is a legend here, too. Old-timers in the Garden-the concessionaires who hustle pop and hot dogs, the long-time ushers, the Garden buffs and the newspapermen who've seen and heard the Garden rock to its rafters with the excitement of a thousand great fights—will never forget a night in 1946.

The story revolves around a young man named Chad Deatrick, a promising roller skater of the 1940's who was utterly fearless in the execution of rousing jumps and spins. No skater was more dedicated to skating and perfecting his techniques than this young, likeable lad whose whole world revolved around his technique. He was unpredictable, outspoken and a showman in every sense of the word. But he worked with an intense dedication that made associates marvel. No jump or spin was too difficult for him to try. And no fall or frustration was too disheartening to stop him from coming off the floor with a smile . . . plus the drive to try again until the maneuver was mastered.

Deatrick's world changed abruptly, along with that of millions of other Americans, when the United States was attacked at Pearl Harbor on the Sunday morning of December 7, 1941. He enlisted in the Seabees and was shipped to the Aleutians—hundreds of miles removed from any roller skating.

The bleak, forbidding climate of the islands was as much a threat to the morale of United States servicemen as the unseen enemy but young Deatrick was not to be denied. With several of his Seabee mates, he built a roller rink from discarded lumber—a roller rink that brought hours of recreation to the lonely Seabees and the opportunity to practice his spins and jumps to Deatrick.

Deatrick was as happy as any other U.S. serviceman doing a job that had to be done and making the best of it. But tragedy was lurking in the island's mists—tragedy that was to strike deep down into the very soul of this dedicated young man.

Tragedy's calling card was pain in Deatrick's right leg. The doctors were puzzled. The pain grew worse. The doctors consulted. Deatrick was flown to the mainland for further examination. The doctors made further tests. And then the decision: Deatrick had developed cancer in the right leg and the only way to save his life was by amputation.

Deatrick's world collapsed. He would never skate again. It was similar to a death sentence. Back in New York on crutches, the youngster watched forlorn and unhappy while others skated. Life seemed to have lost its meaning.

The next time I saw Deatrick I was seated behind a desk helping to plan an anti-polio roller skating show at the Garden. He came into my office on crutches, wearing his Navy uniform, and with a sad but determined smile on his face.

"Mr. Brown, I'd like to skate in the Garden," he said. "Please give me a the chance."

Chad got that chance and what he made of it belongs to the lore of the famous sports arena.

Yes, Chad skated. And how he skated! Spinning, jumping gyrating on one leg this young man who had suffered in war, treated that Garden crowd to one of the most fantastic performances in sports history. Down from the upper reaches of the huge arena came the deafening roar of tribute—tribute to a splendid skater and a courageous man. It mounted to what some old-timers say was the greatest ovation in the Garden history as the spotlight trained down upon him in his final spins and bow—and then he was gone from view.

Amid the cheers there were tears.

The cancer that had robbed him of his first love, now attacked ferociously to rob him of his life. The doctors tried everything they knew. But the cancer could not be stopped. In a short four years—a very short four years—Chad Deatrick passed away.

Chad's one-time Seabee comrades-in-arms carried his coffin from the chapel in the Brooklyn Navy Yard . . . taps were sounded . . . and Chad Deatrick was laid to his final rest in the uniform of his country.

The world has undergone many a convulsion since that sad day but the image of Chad Deatrick shines on as a glorious profile in roller skating courage.







Museum's Memorial Plaque

Almost ten years ago in 1992, the National Museum of Roller Skating Board of Trustees established the Patron Memorial Plaque to "perpetuate the names of individuals for whom a memorial is established by friends or family." The handsome memorial oak plaque was permanently installed in 1993 just inside the museum's door and was dedicated with the following text, "This plaque is dedicated in honor of the following individuals for their significant contributions and love for the sport of roller skating." Beneath the dedication plate are forty-eight individual memorial plates.

Since the plaque's inception, family, friends and roller skating organizations or a combination of all three have purchased thirty of the memorial plates to permanently honor their loved ones. They have used the museum's memorial plaque to show appreciation and to permanently enshrine their loved ones who have spent their lives in the sport or occupation of roller skating. Each plate contains the image of a hockey player, a speed skater or an artistic couple. Next to the skater images are the names of the memorialized individuals with text below of personal information or an inspirational quote about their dedication or contribution to the sport and business of roller skating.

The individuals honored are from all parts of the roller skating community. They are rink owners, athletes and roller skating enthusiasts.

A few of the honorees include:

Thomas Gregory was honored with a plaque purchased by the combine gifts from the USARS Michigan chapter, the Michigan SRSTA chapter, Bert and Lynn Anselmi and Bud and Laurene Patton. Tom was honored for his involvement in roller skating since the age of nine as a competitor, teacher, operator and a friend of many.

John Chrien honored Bud and Shirley Engle upon their induction in the USARS Distinguished Service Hall of Fame.

The Michigan USARS chapter honored Beverly Schien for her many years of dedication to their chapter.

Ralph Horvath honored his wife, Loretta, on the occasion of their 49th wedding anniversary.

Lewis Quintin was honored by combined gifts from Bert and Lynn Anselmi, Charlotte Groves and Robert Bollinger.
