Skater Profile: Harry Palmer Champion Speed Skater from Chicago

This information is taken from the book found in the museum store entitled Skaters History on Ice and Roller Skating. For more information like this, consider purchasing the book. Thanks.



Harry Palmer started skating in the Chicago area in 1907. He participated in the first street marathon in Chicago in 1908. Although this was his first major event, Palmer finished in second place to Carl Carlson by just ten seconds in a field of over one hundred skaters. Afterwards, he furthered his experience by skating in many races at the San Souci Rink of Chicago, winning his fair share.

In 1910 the career of Palmer accelerated. That year he teamed with Howarth Beaumont in team races. They were so successful that this forced many of Chicago's best amateurs to turn professional.

In 1911 Palmer continued upon his success. He finished third in the fifteen mile street marathon sponsored by the Opal Athletic Association of Chicago. Afterwards, Palmer turned professional and won two of his next three races at the Madison Gardens in Chicago. He then retired.

After five years of retirement, Palmer returned to the sport of skating in 1916. He was readmitted to amateur status. In his first race, Palmer finished third from


scratch in a ten mile street marathon. He went on to win the five mile amateur championship at Riverview Rink with a world record time of 14:33. Also at these championships, Palmer finished second in the two mile and third in the half mile.

During his career, Palmer was known as a come-back artist, starting slowly but finishing with a punch. He never quit on a race.

Skate of the Week:



Issued on November 23 of 1869, a patent for the "combined roller and skate" of Mr. A.J. Gibson allowed

for the production of a new brand of skate. Gibson said his skate provided the public with a simple and inexpensive skate with the capabilities of winter and summer use. To change the runners for the winter to the rollers of the summer, an easy two screw and bolt system for both the toe and heel of the plate was implemented. As in the Plimpton model, the rollers could pivot, allowing the skater to maneuver curves. An extra wheel in the front was raised at the toe, enabling a smooth change in direction. Leather straps at both the heel and toe help attached the foot. The adjacent picture shows the skate on rollers.

Library Feature: Skate Crazy



This book was published with the assistance of the museum. Author Lou Brooks came to the museum for research and used many of the rink stickers from the museum's collection to illustrate his book. He even sights the museum as a co-conspirator in helping the book achieve its goal, specifically naming the director and vice president as the most helpful. *Skate Crazy* has a copy right date of 2003.

This book discusses the different time periods in American history and how they affected roller skating practices. To go along with this idea, each chapter reflects a category of skating sticker. Examples are rinks, animals, dancing, women, and flying skates.

The great thing about these roller skating stickers is they give the individual rink an opportunity to express itself through visual means. It can showcase or highlight any aspect of its rink in a way comfortable with the owners. It can give a face to the rink not only for its patrons, but also for those who never skated there. This was a simple form of branding and advertising for individual rinks.

Skate Crazy features over 400 stickers as well as other photographs and postcards. Many of these also came from the museum's collection. What a great resource for those interested in roller skating stickers!
