Warnoco North operated in Greeley, CO until 2004. It began as Sal's Gardens in 1921. A local roller derby team, The Slaughterhouse Derby Girls, hoped to purchase the building as use it as its derby facility. Unfortunately, a city rule dictated that the building may no longer contain a skating business. The building remains vacant.

### Memorial: Rose Martin



Former skater, coach, and museum supporter Rose Martin passed away this week at the age of 86. From the time her father took over management at the Arena Gardens in Detroit, MI, Rose was enveloped within the sport. Her and her family even lived upstairs from the rink.

Over the years Rose was a great supporter of the museum. She donated books, programs, photographs, postcards, medals, patches, skate boxes, scrapbooks, and papers on her father. Many of these first hand items helped us gain the full story of the Arena Gardens and its impact on the local community.

When assistant museum curator Sarah Webber set out to write a short book on the Martin family rink called *The Allure of the Rink: Roller Skating at the Arena Gardens,* Rose lent out her support, knowledge, and advise to accurately depict the history. Webber extended Rose a thank you acknowledgement at the beginning stating: "Rose supplied many of the specific details found here as well as proofread to make sure I had my facts straight."

Our thoughts and sympathies go out to the Rose Martin family. We thank her again for all of her support over the years.

# **Library Feature**The Big Book of Games



The Big Book of Games was compiled by the Roller Skating Association intended for its member skating centers. This new book, copyright 2013, details hundreds of games played while on roller skates.

The book is broken down into fourteen different categories: balloon games, center of the floor games, games played at the birthday table, games played without skates, hands-on and createive games, hoiday games, messy games, minute to win it, races and relays, side aisle games, skating floor games, team building and mixer games, toilet paper games, and trivia.

Under "toilet paper games", skaters race with a roll of toilet paper between their legs. If the roll is dropped, the skater must stop, collect the roll, and place it back between the legs before continuing. Races can be one lap around the rink or as many as dictated.

For a relay race, "pass the potato" needs four members per team, each team with one potato. The first team members puts the potato under his/her chin and skates to the second member. They then exchange the potato using their chins only. This exchange continues through each team member until the last person then skates across the finish line.

"Jail break", listed as a skating floor game, only needs to last the duration of one song. The cops skate around and touch others, who are then in jail off to the side. When enough are jailed, the floor guard yells "jail break" releasing everyone for another round.

1.) Competition worn gear: One of the most commented on parts of the museum collection deals with our event worn items. Whether dance costumes, speed uniforms, derby jerseys, hockey sticks, or specific skates, visitors like to see what people wear while competing in roller skating competitions.

3.) The museum is always in need of **odd and unusual skates.** Visitors are drawn to our different types of skates, variations to the norm, and how others failed to conform to the typical skate. On display now are animals skates as well as motorized skates. With anything you might consider an ODD skate, please contact the museum.

The museum has an extensive collection of roller skating rink stickers. Many skating rinks used to produce stickers as both an advertisement and fun way to for skaters to interact with one another, comparing the different location in which they skated. These were even traded as collectibles both informally and formally, under the Universal Roller Skating Sticker Exchange founded in 1948.
