## **Regional Conference itinerary**

As prevously stated, Lincoln will host the 2013 Mountain-Plains Museum Association annual conference. Before and have this three day event, local attractions are made available to the visitors. Our museum is now officially on the list.

With a theme of transportation, the National Museum of Roller Skating will partner with the American Museum of Speed and the Larsen Tractor Test Museum to create an afternoon of entertain on the last day of the conference. Those signed up for the transportation tour will have 30 minutes at each destination to absorb everything.

### **Grant Presentation**

On Monday, Nov 19 the museum must give a short presentation to the Vistors Improvement Fund board as we seek a grant for our new display cases. Myself and George Pickard, our local museum board member, will breifly dicuss our project with the board so all parties understand how the money will be used and why it will benefit the community at large.

After the presentation, the waiting begins. The Visitors Improvement Fund will decide which organizations are given the grant by the middle of December. Our hope is to receive this grant for \$8,500 so we can properly fund our expansion. If our claim is rejected, we must find other sources of income.

## **USARS/Museum hosted reception**

Prior to the fall meeting of the board of trustees of USA Roller Sports, USARS hosted a small repection. Included with dinner were tours of the museum. With over 40 atendees, most enjoyed a walk-through of the museum after their meal.

## **Derby Donation**



This year USA Roller Sports created a national tournament for its participants of roller derby. Set to be held in Fresno in December, this is the first USARS sponsored roller derby championship.

Upon completion of its new logo shown above, USARS has donated some items from its inaugural year. So far the museum received a t-shirt, stickers, and buttons. The donation will grow once the championship tournament is complete. We expect programs and advertisements as well.

In addition and with much excitement, the museum will house the official USARS roller derby national championship trophy. It will be on permanent display.

This week the museum hosted an international student. Marie-Christen Wedel is a doctoral candidate in Germany and she came to the museum to research her project on the social interactions of roller skating and how skating can create its own unique atmosphere.



Arcadia: Detroit, MI




The Arcadia was one of the two prominent rinks in Detroit, along with the Arena Gardens. The Arcadia hosted many great events over the years, including its first six-day roller race from May 28-June 2 in 1936. It also held carnivals which included kissing booths, a cake sale, penny pitch, and a balloon-dart throw.

## **Roller Skating Firsts**

- First building specifically for roller skating was the Plimpton Building, erected by James Plimpton in New York City during 1863.
- First American public roller rink, the Atlantic House in Newport, Rhode Island; it was operated by Plimpton starting in 1866.

## Skate of the Week Gazelle




The collection of the museum contains many international as well as domestic roller skates. The skate above hails from Europe.

Manufactured by the Dautbert-Bertoni company of Italy, this adjustable quad skate was patented in 1900. A gift of Richard & Marge McLauchlen, this "Gazelle" clamp-on model has rubber wheels upon a metal frame, with separate toe and heel plates. "Bertoni" is engraved on the frame.

### **Library Feature:**

The Skater, Skier, and Ice Hockey Player September 1950



This issue of *The Skater, Skier, and Ice Hockey Player* from 1950 explored aspects of winter sports. Published in London, the monthly one shilling magazine shared photographs, sport specific articles, and skater profiles.

One article discusses England's different roller speed skating clubs. London had two, named Broadway and the Palace. Rochester United of southern England usually placed just behind both London clubs during national tournaments; the Herne Bay Club always tried to remain relevant. The only formidable team in the north was Batley's Rink.

A second article described the 1950 edition of the Skating Vanities as they finished their tour in London. Mentioned were headliner Gloria Nord and her partner Douglas Breniser, Peggy Wallace as the "Sun God Worshipper", and Eileen McDonnell as the partner to Frank Foster in "Symphony in Pink." Tony Mirelli and Rose Piccola performed daring acrobatic duets while Count le Roy thrilled with his roller tap-dancing.

A final literary piece introduces the sport of roller hockey to the reader. While explaining all of the rules and its popularity in Great Britain during that time, the author a nice opening statement on the sport: "roller hockey has often been called the Cinderella of sports, not perhaps unjustly, for whilst the game itself is fast and fascinating, the facilities for presenting it to the public in a worthy manner have only been achieved on rare occasions…"


### **Rink Sticker Collection**
