Curator's Corner

Display Cabinets Filled



When entering the museum, visitors are now greeted with our new display cabinets filled with our great collections.

The first cabinet, as pictured above, contains information on Lincoln, Nebraska as the host city to more national championship competitions than any other city in the country. Each of the twenty-six years of events are commemorated here in the form of posters, pictures, and programs. The display also explains why Lincoln is such an attractive destination for these contests.




The next four displays incorporate the four disciplines of competitive roller skating: artistic, derby, hockey, and speed. Each is represented with varied items from the collection. They give an introduction to the discipline, a brief history, and how each sport continues succeeding before visitors move to the main gallery to learn a deeper understanding of the entire sport.



The final cabinets portray two topics: the evolution of the roller skate and roller rinks of Nebraska. The former quickly explains how the roller skate physically changed while the latter deals with a localized interest.


Estate Gift


The above scrapbook chronicles a Canadian tour of the Skating Vanities during the year 1947.

Skate of the Week Metal Quad Skate



Inventors F.C. Ireland and W.A. Leggo patented their skate in May of 1877. Different from the previous skates, this one has clamps to attach the skater's shoe instead of leather straps.

To keep the wheels parallel, there is a pair of springs at both ends that lie along the axles. Its springs press on the axel, which shifts the direction of the wheels and gives the capabilities to turn corners when the skater leans from side to side. There is also a turning screw under the plate that adjusts the clamps so the skate can fit the size and shape of boot worn by the skater.

Wish List

1.) **Rink Files**: The museum seeks to expand its roller rink files. In the archives, the museum houses files upon files of individual roller rinks from across the country. These files are used for research purposes.

The more rinks we have on file, the greater chance we have to help those searching for information. We are looking for photos, programs, ticket stubs, newspaper articles, and any other primary information about roller rinks.

2.) **Regional programs**: We need modern issues of all regional programs. For example, we need Northeast programs from '93-'00 and '04-present, Southeast '88-'97 and '05-present, and Eastern '86-'97 and '04-present.
