### FIFTY YEARS AGO.....

The world was on the brink of global war. The following article is taken from *The Billboard*, June 3, 1939.

## **International Hockey**

Derby, England—At the 14th European championship in roller hockey on April 7-12 in Montreaux, Switzerland, the event was advertised as the second world's championship on the ground that Argentina and Canada were invited, tho they were not represented. The usual seven European countries participated, and England retained its unbeaten record and kept the title, which it has held since inauguration of the international series in 1924-'25.

In the previous two events Italy was considered the most dangerous opponent of England and tied with it on each occasion. This year Italy had a better goal average than England, and the last game of the series between these countries was the key match and provided the finest exhibition of roller hockey on view during the tournament.

Italy vs. England, the two leading countries started off sensationally. After two minutes' play Bob Hulme, English pivot and great stylist, made one of his solo runs down the center of the rink, beating man after man, finally drawing the Italian goalkeeper out of his cage and tapping the ball into the empty net to applause of a record attendance of 2,700 in Montreaux Rink. England ran out winners by 4-1. Buckley, the new Manchester international netting three. Tho Dr. Marcella Fabianai and his Monza boys had great hopes three times upset by England's triumph of taking the title and trophy back to Italy until they met England, they never resorted to unfair tactics when losing and proved their sportsmanship by taking defeat cheerfully. After the match they presented each British player with a souvenir medal.

A contrast to the brilliant display seen when Italy met England was provided when Italy clashed with Portugal. Some decisions of the Belgian referee. A. Souffle, Antwerp, were unsatisfactory to the Italians, who lodged an official protest with the FIPR after the game, which they lost 2-1. Awarding of a penalty shot to Portugal had drastic effect on their opponents and ended in several players and onlookers being involved in an unfortunate incident

# International Game Regulation Equipment

#### UNIFORMS


JERSEY: Wool, cotton or silk. (Long or short sleeves optional) SHORTS: Cotton or wool. (May be padded). SOX: Ribbed wool, knee high. (Pad beneath, 2 cm. thick).

BOOTS:
Standard skating or hockey style.
HEADGEAR:
Goal Keepers only.
SKATES: Standard.
Abdominal Support is prescribed as necessary.



#### GOAL KEEPERS SHIN GUARDS

Size at shin, 30 cm. wide. Size at knee, 35 cm. wide. Overall height, 75 cm. Thickness (max.) 4 cm. (None for Forwards, Half or Rear Guards).




#### GOAL KEEPERS GLOVES

Not to exceed 25 cm. at most in any dimension when open or closed. (None for Forwards, Half or Rear Guards).



#### THE BALL

Weight: 5 oz. Circum: 23 cm. Cover: Seamless hard rubber. Variety: "Dead" (little resiliency.) Color: Optional.



THE HOCKEY STICK

Composition: Hardwood.

May be taped but may contain no metal weights or reinforcements.

Measurement: Outer curve not longer than 115 cm.
Stick must pass through ring with inside diameter of 5 cm.
Weight not to exceed 500 grams.

wherein blows were exchanged. The FIPR ordered a replay and this resulted in Italy winning, 6-1. Tournament ended with England on top again with 12 points; Italy, second, 8; Portugal, third, 6; France, fourth, 5; and Switzerland, last 2. One point was given for tie and two for a win. Goal averages: England 30 and 9 against; Italy, 26-5; Portugal, 6-12; France 11-27; Germany, 13-14; Belgium 9-14; Switzerland 13-27. In all tournaments so far staged England has finished first, while second place has been filled by France seven times, Italy four times, Germany twice and Switzerland once.

Proof that even with the usual excellent arrangements associated with most European national controlling bodies and the FIRP still too much personal prejudice and favoritism play a part is evidenced in the make-up of at least one team and the fact that an unfortunate incident such as happened in connection with the Italy vs. Portugal game was allowed to be even a possibility.










