### **CURATOR'S CORNER**

I am proud to announce the publication of the new museum book, *The Evolution of the Roller Skate: 1820 - Present.* The book includes over a hundred and forty photos documenting the museum's vast collection and includes chapters ranging from "The History of In-line Skates," to "Odd and Unusual Skates." It is an exciting step for the museum which is seeking to broaden its role in documenting the vast history of roller skating. A more specific description of the new book is included in this month's "Overview" as well as an order form for your convenience.

Other exciting news! The National Museum of Roller Skating will be featured in the April issue of *Smithsonian Magazine*. For the 25th anniversary edition Smithsonian has decided to highlight (among other things) some smaller museums for their readership. A reporter has already visited the museum as well as two photographers who conducted an all day photo shoot for the magazine. I will let you know when the magazine appears on newstands in the spring. Be sure to watch for it!

Speaking of the Smithsonian, I am currently negotiating a loan for a few of the important roller skates from their collection in Washington, D.C. While their collection is quite small, they do have several skates that are of extreme historical significance such as two of the earliest skates known to exist from the early part of the 19th century.

In other museum news, we have received the second half of the Technical Assistance Grant (TAG) which is \$2,500. This money is specifically earmarked for improving the museum's photo collections care. It will provide for improvements in the housing of our photos by allowing us to purchase more acid-free envelopes, steel flat files for large prints and posters, and environmental monitoring equipment to allow us to gauge the humidity and light levels in the museum more effectively. All of these improvements in our collections care help the museum fulfill its goal of providing the best possible environment for preserving the heritage of roller skating.

Three new displays are in the works at the museum. The first will look at the history of the Roller Derby. This is an often overlooked part of roller skating history but I have had enough visitors ask about it to merit its own display. Likewise, for many of the people involved with roller skating, the roller disco era, with its distinctive fashions and music, is a period that deserves little elaboration. Yet for many of the visitors of the museum, the lack of a roller disco exhibit is glaring. Finally, a display featuring the RSROA/RSA is also on the drawing boards. I hope to include a number of photos of older rinks and various other items as well.

Speaking of the RSROA, this issue of the "Overview" highlights the early history of the organization. The information contained in the enclosed article was culled from several sources, but most notably the April 1962 issue of *Skate* magazine which was devoted to the then 25th anni-

versary of the RSROA. Subsequent issues of the "Overview" will continue to highlight the history of the Roller Skating Rink Operators Association of America.

Finally, the December "Overview" features a special section for ordering items from the museum's store (just in time for the holidays)! Included is a special membership offer which will truly be "the gift that keeps on giving" for some lucky individuals. Turn to pg. 4-5 for more details.

# Highlights of RSROA History

1937 - During the first organized national speed meet held at the Arena Gardens, Detroit, Mich., seventeen rink operators gathered together on April 2nd to form the RSROA . . . Each man contributed \$1 to establish the original treasury of the Association . . . Victor J. Brown of Newark, N.J., was elected the first President and Fred A. Martin of Detroit was named Secretary/Treasurer . . . A single drawer in Fred Martin's desk at the Arena Gardens was the first RSROA office . . . Betty Lytle became the first American to earn a Silver Figure medal.

1938 - An organized system of skating proficiency tests was developed by the RSROA . . . Perry Rawson was named Dance Committee Chairman . . . Rawson traveled to England to study dance skating in that country . . . The International style of skate dancing in this country resulted from the trip . . . The RSROA became a member of the Amateur Skating Union . . . The first RSROA skating manual was published. It consisted of only 36 pages.

**1939** - The first national figure skating championships were held at the Arena Gardens, Detroit . . . The first national dance championships were held at Mineola, New York . . . The dances skated included the "Chicken Scratch," the "Old Style Two-Step," and the "American Promenade." Rodney R. Peters of St. Louis, Mo., was elected RSROA President.

1940 - The first combined national Championships were held at the Public Auditorium, Cleveland, Ohio . . . Walter Stokosa of Detroit, the nation's first Senior Men's Figure Skating Champion, successfully defends his title . . . The RSROA institutes its own program of commissioning judges . . . Victor J. Brown who served as President in 1937 and 1938 was re-elected to the office . . . "Skating Review," a national roller skating magazine, was published . . . A three-week professional skating teachers' school was conducted at the Arena Gardens . . . Some seventy professionals from around the country attended the school.

1941 - Five Senior Men's speed records were set at the American Championships in Cleveland . . . Melva Block won the first of her two Senior Ladies Figure Skating Championships . . . Fred H. Freeman of Boston, Mass., was elected to his first of three successive one-year terms as RSROA President . . . The RSROA staged the American Roller Skating Carnival for the New York Journal American at Madison Square Garden before a capacity crowd of 18,000 spectators . . . Much national publicity resulted from this giant roller skating extravaganza which featured RSROA skating champions.

1942 - The "Skating Vanities" made its debut in Baltimore with Gloria Nord in the starring role... Fours skating was added to the competitive schedule of the American Championships . . . Stating the Amateur Skating Union was not in sympathy with roller skating, the RSROA re-


signed on March 13th from the ASU... In a poll conducted by the "Skating Review," the Death Spiral was named the most daring and difficult pairs movement of the year... The RSROA Board of Control made plans for the formation of an Amateur Athletic Guild, exclusive to the sport of roller skating... Roller Skating Teachers were certified by the RSROA as associate members... Written judges commission examinations were instituted... "Skating Review" was adopted as the official publication of the RSROA after several years of service in an unofficial capacity.

1943 - The ranks of amateur skating champions was reduced by enlistments in the armed services . . . A controversy developed over the adjustment of the action of the skate. Perry Rawson favored flexible trucks as opposed to the loose and rigid skate action schools of thought . . . Former RSROA skating champion Melva Block was featured in a roller skating number in the movie, "Private Miss Jones" starring Judy Garland . . . "Roller Skating Vanities" appeared in the 20th Century Fox movie, "Pin-Up Girl" which starred Betty Grable . . . American Championships were held at the Arena Gardens, Detroit.

1944 - The RSROA staged a gigantic roller skating benefit show for Infantile Paralysis at Madison Square Garden ... Playing to a capacity audience, the show featured roller champions form the Eastern United States, supported by the exhibitions of RSROA teachers. The show was acclaimed a great success ... William T. "Pop" Brown was elected to the first of the four consecutive terms as President of the Association . .. Ensign James Costigan of the U.S. Maritime Service and Ruth Crouse won the Senior Dance title at the National Championships . . . Arthur Russell won the Senior Men's Figure Championships.

1945 - The RSROA begins publication of its own magazine, "Skating News" . . . The National Championships were cancelled at the request of the Office of Defense Transportation . . . Fred Bergin was appointed Dean of the RSROA Teachers' College which was the beginning of the Society of Roller Skating Teachers of America . . . Another polio benefit was staged by the RSROA at Madison Square Gardens. Over 900 skaters participated in the show . . . Harry S. Truman, new President of the United States, appeared on the cover of "Skating News" . . . The United States Federation of Amateur Roller Skaters was founded as the amateur affiliate of the RSROA. Dr. Keith Kahn was elected chairman of the USFARS Board of Governors . . . Rora M. Hodder succeeded Fred Bergin as Chairman of Judges, Test and Competition under the new RSROA framework . . . The intermediate division was introduced in all classes of art skating. Service amputees skated at Vic Brown's New Dreamland roller rink, Newark, N.J., as part of a physical therapy program started by Brown and the RSROA.


