## TEXAS TORNADO SWEEPS CHAMPIONSHIPS!

LITTLE ROCK, ARK. - For the second consecutive year, Senior Champions found rough going defending their titles in the 1960 American Amateur Roller Skating Championships, while Paul Boehm of Pasadena, Texas took individual honors with four championships.

The "Texas Tornado" took firsts in Novice Figures, Intermediate Singles and Novice Dance, and Intermediate Pairs with partner Pamela Cornwall.

It marked only the third time in the history of the American Championships that a skater captured four titles. J.W. Norcross (Greeley, Colo.) took four Senior events in 1950 and Roy Huckaby (Beaumont, Texas) won four Juvenile titles in 1956.

Rob Wollard and Carol Stout of Long Beach, Calif. successfully defended their Senior Pairs title. Wollard also captured the Senior Men's Singles on the final night of the competition, with 1955-56 Champion Edgar Watrous of Hartford, Conn. second and James Harmer of Wooster, Ohio third.

1957-58 Senior Ladies Singles Champion Carolyn Sliger of Oklahoma City, Okla. regained her crown with a spectacular routine that brought the spectators to their feet at the finish. Beverly Bowers of London, Ontario was second and defending Champior Sylvia Haffke of Agawam, Mass. third.

Defending Senior Dance Champions Charles Wahlig and Claire Farrell of Brooklyn, N.Y. were dethroned by Linda Jo Baker and Jack Greer of Atlanta, Ga. Wahlig had held the title for three years, the last two with Claire as his partner.

It was the same story in the Senior Figure events with both Darrell Glenn of Long Beach, Calif. and Paulette Stewart

of Redwood City, Calif, losing their titles. Glenn finished second to Tom Gregory of Pontiac, Mich. Paulette failed to make the finals which were won by 1958 Champion Chris Benda of Grandview, Mo.

Sylvia Ritchie, Louis Parker, Rick Martins, and Sue Welch of Pontiac, Mich. won the Senior Fours title with Don Scheiber, Christy Cowdery, Eugene LaBriola, and Judy Nance of Marysville, Calif. second. Last year's championship team did not defend in this event.

### Speed Events

Two speed records, one standing since 1941, were broken during the Championships. George Grudza of Penndel, Pa. who captured the Senior Men's speed championship established a new mark of 14:52:4 in the five mile race, eclipsing the old record of 14:52:7 set 19 years ago in Cleveland, Ohio.

Finishing second behind Grudza in the Senior Men's speed division were John Drewry of Irvington, N.J. and Eddie Perales of Redondo Beach, Calif. Last year's champion Gerry Gohs of Detroit, Mich. finished seventh.

Scott Harrity of Pontiac, Mich. set a new record of:19.3 in the Juvenile "D" Boys one-twelfth mile race replacing the old time of:19.4 set at Cleveland in 1958.

Mary Merrell of Fullerton, Calif. won the Senior Ladies speed event for the second consecutive year with Nina Marmarino of Irvington, N.J. second and Sally Richardson of Detroit third.

Speedsters from Wichita, Kansas captured the Men's, Ladies' and Mixed Relay speed events. Pat Carter, Charles Stover, Ronald Watkins and Richard Edwards won the Men's Relay. With the exception of Watkins, this is the same team that won the event last year.

The Ladies' Relay was won by Jody Fehring, Barbara Solter, Cindy Rodick and Lynda Stawitz with Cindy the only newcomer from last year's winning team.

Patrick Carter, Charles Stover, Jody Fehring, and Barbara Solter won the Mixed Relay with teammates Ronald Watkins, Richard Edwards, Bonnie Matsen and Lynda Stawitz second.


