Skater Profile: Jesse Darling Peerless Princess

From Providence, Rhode Island Jesse Darling became one of the greatest female "fancy" skaters ever. She skated from Nova Scotia to the Pacific Coast, leaving spectators with the thoughts they witnessed a floating fairy. She skated a waltz and her famous cakewalk on skates. Darling regularly skated shows twice daily for an admission price of 15 cents.

As her talents expanded, so did her audiences. Darling began to tour Europe in 1909 and performed in countries like England, France, and Germany. On this leg of her touring she used jewel-studded skates.

Upon returning to the United States, Darling teamed with Henry Simmons to become the Skating Bijouves. They traveled the country doing vaudeville shows and receiving rave reviews.

#### Skate of the Week:



Located in our "Odd and Unusual Skates" display, this motorized skate is fan favorite among out visitors. Created by local Nebraskan Vernon Quy of Fremont, NE this skate is powered by its attached chainsaw motor. Affixed to the toe of the left skate, this motor powers the skate through a pulley system. When operational, the skate can travel at a safe speed of a few miles per hour up to the maximum range of about 30mph.

Along with the skate, our museum received photos of Vernon wearing the skates, newspaper articles, and a video of him on the Tonight Show demonstrating his contraption to Johnny Carson himself. This piece is currently on permanent display in our gallery.

> Library Feature: Rollermania By Sam Nieswizski



This book is an excellent source in not only the history of roller skating but also in its photographs. The accuracy of the information included in the book is difficult to verify since the book is written in French. But the photographs are of both great quality and quantity.

The first chapter discusses early roller skating, prior to the mass manufacturing. Nieswizski uses sketches, paintings, and patent renderings to illustrate his points of how the evolution of the roller skate took place.

His second chapter begins with the important date of 1863, when the patent of James Plimpton changed the history of the roller skating industry forever. Nieswizski shows in a patent sketch how this skate was different, how it could turn corners with ease. The chapter then contains many pictures of groups of people skating together, since this invention greatly aided in the explosion of roller skating to the masses.

The remaining chapters seem to focus on the percolation of roller skating into the lives of everyone the world over. Skating competitions began. Children skate on sidewalks as well as in rinks. Hockey and derby grow. Even motion pictures include roller skating in their main plots. And this is all done with great photographs. While not the easiest to decipher, perhaps this book's greatest attribute to the museum's collection are is photographs.






