



Chicago produced a small pamphlet detailing the highlights and advantages of obtaining a portable rink.



Chicago advertised the finest smooth floor with no ridges. These new interlocking hard "rock maple" floors were supported on locking girders. Special patent tightening features were easy to set up with no bolts or cables required. Sizes 40x90 to 48x120 were available with prices determined upon request.


Rain Proof Tents

Triple stitched seams, 12 oz. double twist U. S. Army duck. Three thicknesses at poles. Special laps over lacing seams. Hoods over poles. Now the GREATEST tent built.



The tents used poles with steel joints and four foot hardened steel stakes. The finest un-oiled Manila rope stood alongside galvanized steel cables, unaffected by weather. Wall curtains rolled up to allowed plenty of light and fresh air. With skate and clothes racks, rails, and all fixtures, this complete unit quickly set up and knocked down without the use of a nail.

Our tents are constructed from double filling waterproofed Khaki duck, 12 oz. for top and 8 oz. for walls. The canvas is treated so it will not only turn water, but will not mildew. Our tents are square hip-roof style, with three to five center poles, according to size of tent and are made push-pull style, with a hood sewed onto the top of the center pole spike, thus assuring a water-proof cover over the pole. The top is made in three to four pieces and each lace with a double lap over the lacing so as to make it water-proof. The sidewalls are made 7 ft. 6 in. high with pull-up ropes at every pole hole. The side poles are 8 ft. high and spaced 7 ft. apart, which raises the side-wall off the ground 6 in. to allow for circulation of air at the bottom. The stakes are made of hickory, and have extra heavy iron bands at the top. The inside of tent is trimmed in red, and thoroughly reinforced under the ridge and at all pole holes. The top is roped with the best grade Manila rope, and all roping is put on by hand. The weight of 40x90 ft. tent complete is about 2,000 pounds.



The skating surface of our 40x90 ft. portable rink floor contains forty-five 6.6x13 ft. sections. These floors are laid and fastening manipulated entirely from the top side, and on level ground the only underpinning needed is that necessary to keep the plate out of the dirt. On uneven ground only such underpinning is required as is necessary to level the floor frame.

This floor loads into a car almost as compactly as new lumber and 40x90 ft. floors and larger can be loaded into a 36 ft. car, leaving plenty of room for all other paraphernalia necessary to complete portable rink outfit. 40x90 ft. floor weights approximately 15,000 lbs. This is one of the lightest practical portable rink floors built. Prices upon application.

Arena Gardens Skate Shop



Citizens of Detroit could skate at The Arena Gardens knowing they could enjoy skating in a safe and wellmanaged environment. Among the positive achievements the rink attained, one of the most important became the success of its Skate Shop.

In this skate shop, customers could rent skates to use for the day. Prior to 1941, the Arena Gardens rented clamp-on skates for a price of ten cents. Afterwards the rink began using boot skates. During operation the Arena Gardens always made sure to have 1,500 pairs of skates maintained and ready for immediate use.

One of the first United States rinks to have a store, the skate shop of the Arena Gardens began as a small room off of the main entrance with a window facing Woodward Avenue. Inventory of the store included boots, accessories, skate cases, men's and women's clothing, and skates. In 1940 the store began selling skating attire; women's dresses had an average price of ten dollars but also could exceed sixty dollars.

By 1945 the store started selling skates. Skates for men, women, and children were in stock. There existed a fitting room for purchasing skates. This way, skaters could have their skates fitted properly to their feet instead of the alternative of mail order and hopes of the skates fitting right. The price of skates dropped to around fifteen dollars a pair by 1944 which drastically increased sales. Almost half of the skaters in the Arena Garden purchased their own pair of skates. The skate shop then grew in popularity and profitability. Store orders averaged about 3,000 skate sales each year. Brothers of Fred Martin managed the skate shop and offered a great service: skate maintenance. Thousands of customers relied on this service to keep their skates in good working condition.

Rink Sticker Collection

The museum has an extensive collection of roller skating rink stickers. Many skating rinks used to produce stickers as both an advertisement and fun way to for skaters to interact with one another, comparing the different location in which they skated. These were even traded as collectibles both informally and formally, under the Universal Roller Skating Sticker Exchange founded in 1948. Each newsletter, we will feature different rink stickers. Here are a few examples of the numerous stickers in the collection and on display at the National Museum of Roller Skating.
