The National Museum of Roller Skating is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization located in Lincoln, Nebraska and the only dedicated roller skating museum in the world. We are committed to the preservation of the history of roller skating. With over 50 display cases, the museum educates the public on all aspects of roller skating, which dates back to the first patented skate from 1819.

Curator's Corner

New Display



Our new display called "RSA's Kind Heart" details the involvement with charitible functions that the roller skating industry participated in throughout the last 75 years. In 1943 the RSROA addopted as its personal charity the National Foundation for Infantile Parallysis, which fought polio. With the eradiction of polio in the 1950s, RSROA shifted its focus to other causes.

In 1957 the RSROA joined up with the Easter Seals. This organizations worked with children and families with physical disbilities to improve their way of life. The following year Easter Seals became an official charity of the RSROA along with the NFIP.




In the 1970s RSROA become involved with the Muscular Dystrophy Association. It began with one rink owner named John Sheen of the Louisville Rollatorium. Mr. Sheen held a twenty-four hour rollation over the Thanksgiving weekend of 1971 in conjunction with his local MDA office. This event was so large that the rink had to turn people away because they ran out of skate rentals. The affair raised \$845. The national MDA office was then contacted to encourage a more permanent connection with the RSROA.



The following year the RSROA adopted MDA as an official charity. RSROA president Burt Anselmi pledged \$50,000 for its first year's contibution; a total of 70 rinks raised \$72,000 through skate-a-thons and other fundraisers. In 1976 RSROA contributed \$1.5 million. The Jerry Lewis telethon booked skaters for the annual show. Mr. Lewis himself even attended a few RSROA national convetions to show his appreciation.

In addition to domestic performances, the Skating Vanities participated in European and South American tours. They skated in front of crowds, which later included the Open and the Queen of England.

While every skater added to the lore of the show, the main attraction and headliner of the show was Ms. Gloria Nord. A former ballet dancer turned skater, Nord performed hes shows with precise timing and grace that captivated the audience. She was the featured skater in many acts.

notice Noroskog, the greatnephew of former roller skating great Gloria Nord of the Skating Vanities, called the museum a few months ago to gage our interest in accepting a donation from his great-aunt's skating days. He tantalized our imaginations



Located in our "Odd and Unusual Skates" display, this motorized skate is fan favorite among out visitors. Created by local Nebraskan Vernon Quy of Fremont, NE this skate is powered by its attached chainsaw motor. Affixed to the toe of the left skate, this motor powers the skate through a pulley system. When operational, the skate can travel at a safe speed of a few miles per hour up to the maximum range of about 30mph.

Along with the skate, our museum received photos of Vernon wearing the skates, newspaper articles, and a video of him on the Tonight Show demonstrating his contraption to Johnny Carson himself. This piece is currently on permanent display in our gallery.
